Predicting Student Success At Yavapai College

The Iron Triangle is the belief that Access, Cost, and Quality are linked in such a way that to change one, we must change one or both of the others. For example, to expand Access, some leaders in higher education believe that they must, by definition, either increase Costs or decrease Quality. In this session, we will discuss the types of costs at community colleges. We will explore several different definitions of quality at a college. I will share my definitions of costs and quality in the logistic regression analysis I performed in order to better understand the

relationship between the two. Finally, we will discuss how these results may help our ability to improve student success at Yavapai College.
